A Message from AFRECS Executive Director Richard Parkins

A CHANCE AT A NEW BEGINNING

In the midst of Eastertide, it is especially appropriate to think of new beginnings – resurrection and new life. As we all know, South Sudan entered its independence era with much joyful anticipation but also with much baggage which could delay its emergence as a free and democratic nation. It is to the credit of her leaders who recognize that the reality of the past needs attention if South Sudan is to develop into a stable and just society. The stories of past injury and tragedy will become grist for a national conversation this summer when an initiative will engage South Sudanese in a truth and reconciliation training process. The document that provides the background and framework for this program, [“Sustainable Peace with Justice”](#) is available through the AFRECS website and is worth a careful read.

The document calls on a cross section of the nation to participate with special attention to the role of civil society as a key player. The Church is noted as having a dominant role in the organization and execution of a national conversation where past wrongs are acknowledged, forgiveness sought, and reconciliation pursued as the desired outcome. This tall order presents the people of faith in South Sudan with a daunting challenge that must be buttressed with prayer and deep reflection, giving careful thought to the Gospel message of peace and reconciliation. It is also an occasion for our prayers and earnest support for our brothers and sisters in Sudan as they take on this task – a task that, if successfully carried out, creates new possibilities for peace and justice for this struggling nation. The courage to embark on this journey will hopefully be matched with the zeal and commitment that helped South Sudan achieve its independence in 2011.

On Easter Sunday (3/31/13), many viewed the 60 Minutes program which recalls the struggle that preceded the emergence of South Sudan, lifts up the sacrifice and determination of young Sudanese in their quest for freedom, a new life, and the burden of leadership which they now carry. The program also bears witness to all who shared a journey with Sudanese friends. [This link on our website](#) offers readers a chance to see this program which resonates with so many of us who were participants in this earlier history of South Sudan. Their stories remind us that Easter is a present reality in the lives of many. Let us pray that for those in the Nuba Mountains, Darfur, and Abyei the dawn of Easter will not be too far away.
